
Parallel Pressure

The Prevention of Worldliness

- 1 John 2:15 Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him.
- James 4:4 Ye adulterers and adulteresses, know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God?

The Prevention of Worldliness

- 1 John 2:15 <u>Love</u> not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man <u>love</u> the world, the <u>love</u> of the Father is not in him.
- James 4:4 Ye <u>adulterers</u> and <u>adulteresses</u>, know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God?



The Best Use of the Terms

- A. The terms identify one of the reasons why sin is sinful: because it is disloyal love for God.

 (parallel)
- B. The terms help us to recognize one of the sources of our sin: the pressure of the world.

 (pressure)

The Best Use of the Terms

- C. We should reserve these terms for those times when they most appropriately describe a sin, because the parallel or the pressure is especially evident.
- D. We should be especially careful when applying the term *worldly* to a person.

Secondary Usage: Are There Worldly Things?

A. We might use these terms to distinguish those aspects of a culture which arise from the godless direction of the world.

Secondary Usage: Are There Worldly Things?

B. We might use these terms to describe things which are not inherently sinful, but may be unwise for Christians because of their strong association with the world.

Secondary Usage: Are There Worldly Things?

- C. We must be aware of two troublesome tendencies.
 - 1. The tendency to make these secondary uses primary.
 - 2. The tendency to scorn these secondary uses.
